Running Away



When I was five years sober, I was walking along a road in Great Neck, Long Island, when I saw a guy coming directly toward me. This guy had once cheated me out of several thousand dollars by cashing an insurance check of mine that he had mistakenly received. And there was no reason for him to not have paid me back. Instead of confronting him, though, I chose to cross the street.

That was an AA awakening. I vowed never to do that again. Running away was not going to be an option anymore. Neither was ignoring

situations or excusing other people's bad behavior, such as telling myself he needed the money more than I did.

I had always done almost anything to avoid confrontation. After all, "they" might not like me. "They" were so much more important than I was. But that day, I asked God to give me to courage not only to understand my behavior, but to overcome this character defect of mine.

An amazing part of my AA journey is discovering that when I directly handle life's problems head-on, most of them resolve quite easily. For me, courage is not only doing "the next right thing," but to begin to act appropriately. The Steps have helped me to "say what I mean, but

never say it mean." Action. Step Seven. That's the key for me. No more running away.


- In another meeting the whole subject of money in A.A. got a most healthy kicking around. A.A.'s principle of "no compulsory fees or dues" *can* be construed and rationalized into "no voluntary group or individual responsibility at all," and this fallacy was exploded with a bang. There was complete unanimity that through voluntary contributions the legitimate bills of groups, areas, and A.A. as a whole *must* be paid or we could not properly carry our message. It was agreed that no A.A. treasury ought to get overstuffed or rich. Nevertheless, it was emphasized that the notion of keeping A.A. "simple" and "spiritual" by eliminating vital services that happened to cost a little time, trouble, and money was risky and absurd. It was the opinion of the meeting that oversimplification, which might lead us to muff our Twelfth Step work, area-wide and world-wide, could
- To people familiar with endless drives for charitable funds, A.A. presented a strange and refreshing spectacle. Approving editorials here and abroad generated a great new wave of confidence in the integrity of Alcoholics Anonymous. They pointed out that the irresponsible had become responsible, and that by making financial independence part of its tradition, Alcoholics Anonymous had revived an ideal that this era had almost forgotten. This is why A.A.'s Tradition Seven now reads: "Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions." <u>Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age</u>, pg. 114.

CONCEPTIVII

The Conference recognizes that the Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments: that the Trustees are thereby fully empowered to manage and conduct all of the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is further understood that the Conference Charter itself is not a legal document: that it relies instead upon the force of tradition and the power of the A.A. purse for its final effectiveness.

Perspectives on Concept VII

- The charter and bylaws of the **General Service Board (GSB)** ARE legal documents. The charter of the *General Service Conference (GSC)* IS NOT. Period! Because of that, there may be times where the *Conference* has, shall we say, gone off the deep end, and the **Trustees** (legally or otherwise) need to reel them back in through the vetoing of a *Conference* action. To date, this has not happened. The **Trustees** have "legal authority," where the *Conference* only has "moral authority." *-Breakdown provided by Takethe12.org*
- The General Service Board rotates, but the consciousness never dies; the Trustees will rotate out in time and be reabsorbed into consciousness. https://first164.blogspot.com/
- Theoretically, the Conference is an advisory body only; but practically speaking, it has all the ultimate power it may ever need. -The Twelve Concepts for World Service Illustrated; Concept VII
- "If... the Conference will always bear in mind actual rights, duties, responsibilities and legal status of the General Service Board, and if the trustees... will constantly realize that the Conference is the real seat of ultimate service authority... neither will be seriously tempted to make a 'rubber stamp' out of the other... In this way, grave issues will always be resolved and harmonious cooperation will be the general rule." -The Twelve Concepts for World Service Illustrated; Concept VII





TWELVE TIPS ON MEETING ETIQUETTE

- **Try to be on time.** Better yet, arrive 20 minutes early and stay 20 minutes later and join the 20/20 Club! An important component of meetings is fellowship. Arriving 20 minutes prior to the meeting beginning allows for time to converse and get to know other members of the group. Staying 20 minutes after the meeting allows for time to further converse and develop new relationships.
- **Limit the ups and downs.** Get your coffee, take your final smoke break and make that last run to the bathroom before the meeting starts. Of course, maybe nature calls or that cigarette can't wait. When that happens, try to be the least disruptive as possible when you leave, preferably waiting for the person sharing to finish before getting up.
- **Limit cell phone use and conversation during the meeting.** Sharing in a meeting can be an intimidating experience for a lot of people. Additional chatter or side conversations can be distracting and even hurtful to the person sharing and those trying to listen.
- **Remember what fellowship you are visiting.** Going to a meeting outside of your typical fellowship is a lot like visiting someone else's home. You want to respect their practices where you can. So, if you're in a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous it's customary to identify as an alcoholic rather than an addict, or say drinking instead of using. It's a nice gesture that shows respect for the meeting and fellowship.
- **Be respectful of the meeting topic.** It's generally best practice to stick to the meeting topic when sharing in a meeting. Many groups, however, will offer an opportunity to share at the beginning or end of the meeting if something is threatening your sobriety. Another good practice is to limit or avoid profanity when sharing, especially in an open meeting.
- **Be mindful of how long you share.** Many meetings, though certainly not all, will offer a suggested time limit for how long each person may share. Some meetings may even have a timekeeper. Staying within the recommended time limit allows more people a chance to participate.
- **Participate in the 7th Tradition as best you can.** All groups are self-supporting and do not accept donations from non-members or outside entities. During the meeting a basket is passed to pay the cost of renting the room, the coffee, etc.; but there is no obligation to contribute. In fact, we would prefer that you didn't until you're sure you belong.
- **Avoid cross-talk.** It is a generally accepted practice to avoid cross-talk, which is addressing a share at another person rather than the group. When shares are directed to the group everyone can benefit from the message being offered and no one individual in the group is singled out. Additionally, members will often try to limit their shares to their own experience, using "I" rather than "you."
- **Avoid double-dipping.** While each group has its own meeting practices, many meetings will observe a spoken or unspoken suggestion to avoid double-dipping, which is sharing more than once in a meeting. By only sharing once, more people in the group have an opportunity to participate.
- **Find out where you can smoke or vape.** One of the easiest ways to figure out where a twelve-step meeting is by spotting the smokers and vapers outside. Not only is it a good clue about where the meeting is but also where smoking and vaping is allowed.
- **Respect anonymity.** As one of the guiding principles of our programs, anonymity protects not only the individual but also twelve-step programs as a whole. Each person who attends a twelve-step meeting has a right to have their anonymity protected outside of the meeting.
- **Make connections.** Get a phone list. In some meetings, the chairperson will offer newcomers a list of phone numbers of individuals in your gender to reach out to for support and possible sponsorship. It is strongly advised that women stick with the women and men stick with the men. If no list is available ask people if you can get their phone number.

July 1940	Dr. Bob writes an article for Grapevine, "On Cultivating Tolerance."
July 2-3. 1955	Bill W. turns, "the Fellowship over to the Fellowship." Five thousand people attend A.A.'s 20th Anniversary celebration at the St. Louis Convention.
July 2-4, 1965	Ten thousand people attend the 30th Anniversary of A.A. in Toronto. The Responsibility Declaration, (I am Responsible) is adopted.
July 2, 1965	First "Best of Bill: and a pocket sized "12 and 12" sold. First "LaVigne," Canadian Grapevine published.
July 2, 2000	20 millionth copy of Big Book given to Al-Anon in Minneapolis, MN
July 3-5, 1970	35th Anniversary of A.A. in Miami and Bill W.'s last public appearance.
July 3-6, 1980	45th Anniversary of A.A. in New Orleans. First true marathon meeting was held.
July 4, 1940	Bill D. (A.A. #3) checks out of City Hospital (Akron, OH) after hearing the message from Bill W. and Dr. Bob. A.A.'s first group is formed on this day. Bill D. never drank again.
July 4-6, 1975	40th Anniversary of A.A. in Denver. World's largest coffee server serves 1/2 million cups per day.
July 7, 1940	Bill W. attends first summer session at School of Alcohol Studies at Yale University.
July 11, 1960	Time magazine publishes article, "Passionately Anonymous," on the 25th Convention.
July 14, 1939	Blythewood Sanitarium (Greenwich, CT): Dr henry Tiebout gives a Big Book to Marty M. (one of the first women to get sober in A.A.) and she promptly throws it back at him. She eventually gets sober and goes on to found the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependent (NCADD) to educate others on Alcoholism.
July 18, 1938	Bill W. uses <u>Alcoholics Anonymous</u> as a working title for the Big Book and name for the fellowship in a letter to Dr. Richards at Johns Hopkins.
July 22, 1897	William Duncan Silkworth, M.D. (Silky), author of "The Doctor's Opinion," was born in Brooklyn, NY.
July 22, 1980	Marty M., one of the first women in A.A. (see above) dies sober.
July 23, 1940	Philadelphia A.A.'s send 10% of contributions to the Alcoholic Foundation (later becomes A.A. World Services), setting a precedent.
July 28-30, 1950	First A.A. International Convention held in Cleveland, Ohio and the Twelve Traditions are adopted.
